Summary of the Lesson:

We'll define ekphrastic poetry. We'll explore the origins of the ekphrastic poetry and read examples and talk about the line breaks in the examples. The students will do a pre-writing exercise and then write an ekphrastic poem. They will then have the opportunity to read their poems to the whole group.

ARTS LESSON STRUCTURE: Attention, Review, Teach, and Support

Students will be shown a video, and then they will define theme in their own words. We will discuss common themes often found in literature.	I'll show the students several small sections of the painting that they will eventually write an ekphrastic poem about. I'll ask a series of questions to get the thinking about what they see, hear, smell in the images

The academic vocabulary for the lesson includes theme, moral, and metaphor.	I'll share the history of ekphrastic poetry and the origins of the word. The academic vocabulary for this lesson will include theme, ekphrastic poetry, and line breaks.	
Teach: What will you do to teach the content?

As a class, we will read and discuss the text <u>The Magical</u> <u>Lost Brocade</u> . Students will identify the character's words and actions to determine theme. Graphic organizers will be used. Metaphors will be identified during the discussion.	Using a PPT that will include text, video, and images, I'll share definitions and examples. We will read and critique an ekphrastic poem and make a list of themes the students may use in their own poems. The lesson will be a mix of whole-group discussion and individual time to brainstorm and write.	
At a later date, students will be assigned leveled readers. They will read and use graphic organizers to determine theme. They will also identify and explain any metaphors.	During the individual sessions, I'll be available on camera and in the chat to answer student questions or give additional directions, if needed.	
Discussion will follow.	Since this is the first session of this lesson, I'll ask the students what they know about ekphrastic poetry and then I'll define it.	
	I'll share a video of a poet reading an ekphrastic poem.
