CLAY MODELING INSTRUCTIONS

- Introduction to clay modelling
- Review modelling materials and tools
- There are three basic methods of modelling: (pinch, coil and slab) to mold an object like cup, pot, bowl etc.







PINCHING INSTRUCTIONS

- This technique involves shaping the clay by pinching it between the thumb and fingers.
- Pinching is often used to create small, hollow forms like bowls, cups, and pots.
- It is an excellent technique for beginners to develop a feel for the clay and control over its shape.







COILING INSTRUCTIONS

- Coiling involves rolling out long, thin ropes of clay and then stacking them to create a form.
- The coils can be left visible for a textured effect, or they can be smoothed and blended together to create a seamless surface.
- This technique is suitable for building larger, more complex shapes, such as vases or sculptures.







SLAB BUILDING INSTRUCTIONS

- Slab building involves rolling out flat, even sheets of clay and then cutting and assembling them into the desired shape.
- Slabs can be used to create boxes, cylinders, or more complex structures.
- This technique is ideal for creating geometric forms and requires careful attention to detail to ensure the edges and corners are neat and aligned.


