Core Content Learning Objective: -understand the origin & purpose of the comic strip -create a 'text' or a short story for a comic strip -use at least one onomatopoeia word in the comic strip -to be able to 'tell' a story without words — to construct a story in a limited format — only 4 panels -to summarize main idea in a few or no words -history or origin io comics		Assessment: -creation of (short) text for comic strip

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ARTS LESSON STRUCTURE: Attention, Review, Teach, and Support

Attention: How will you prepare the students for the lesson?				
Teacher -Discussion of characters, talked about quotation marks, -discussed story materials, used onomatopoeia for its' connection to last lesson	Artist -excite students by showing examples of my own comic strip -review of materials for project -discussion of favorite student comic strip characters			
Review: What will you review? What is the academic vocabulary for the lesson?				
Teacher	Artist -comic strip -sequence -storyboard -dialogue (optional) -speech bubble -template/panel			





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Teach: What will you do to teach the content?			
Teacher	Artist -personalize comic strips – for each student -presentation of keynote – origin of the comic strip; the idea of sequential images telling a story; the use of onomatopoeia words in most (if not all) comic strips -to remind students – that comic strips are essentially a short story, told in pictures with very little text, with some optional dialogue -to remind students that anything goes – but it must be in a story		
Support: What will you assign the students to complete and how will you support their learning?			
Teacher	Artist -the challenge for students will be to create a character; think of a story for that character; Illustrate that short story in only 4 panels or steps, using at least one onomatopoeia word as dialogue – and to make the comic strip an engaging story		
Closure: What will we do to reinforce learning and close	the lesson for today?		
-students will share their comic strips with the class -positive and constructive comments always follow – with	appreciation from the teachers
