






## Remember last time?

## **PANTOMIME**

Pantomime refers to a style of theater where the actor never speaks and imagines all the props and setting. Through their skill the audience can easily believe everything they are pretending to do. A person who performs this art is called a mime.







Many mimes paint their faces but that is not necessary. All of them, however, manipulate their bodies to look like they are interacting with all sorts of objects. They can look like they're opening windows, swinging hammers, and even walk in place.







One of the most famous mimes of all time was a Frenchman named Marcel Marceau. He painted his face white, wore a striped shirt and wore a beat up hat. Many mimes copied this style from him.





He was a master at creating entire scenes out of thin air. His attention to detail is what made him stand apart. You really saw the objects in your mind when he performed. He became an instant international star and toured the world for decades. He even came to Wilkes-Barre where I saw him when I was 9.
