Then your groups all received your poems and got to work on them. You met with me and discussed ways to divvy them up and have the whole group take part. Some of you even began memorizing them.







Off book

Off-book simply means memorized. That's it. In a rehearsal process there comes a point where actors have to be offbook.





On book

'On book" is a phrase that means two things. An actor can still be "on book" meaning they don't have the lines memorized. Also, when you are trying to memorize lines you can have someone "on book". This means there is someone near you with the script who tells you the line if you toraet

Today I just want to share some ideas to keep in mind as you rehearse your group poems.





When you present your poems you want to look like a tight knit group. You should all be standing next to each other in the same straight line. No one should be in front or behind. This helps you look put together and organized.




Make sure there aren't any unnecessary long pauses in your reading. As you get comfortable with your lines you can anticipate when your line is coming up. This means you have to listen closely to your team members.





Also, respect your teammates by not stealing focus when they are speaking. Don't start moving around when they are talking. You want the audience to hear what they have to say. They've been respectful while you were talking so you can do the same for them.
