Summary of the Lesson:

Students are warmed up with either a movement storytelling technique, or a visual story map technique as a way to recall parts of a story. After watching the second half of cartoon, reviewing personification, and the use of simple shapes, students are asked to pair share what they watched – "What were the two characters like?" and "What is the difference between a cartoon from 1965 compared to a cartoon from today?" The artist introduces and models the technique for beginning the panels for the stories.
