





### To learn about the history of books, how to put together a poetry collection, and how to read poems out loud.






### <u>What is one of your favorite books?</u>

### **Book Building Timeline**

#### Write:

Some people write fast; others slow. It varies for poetry and prose. Poems in my first book were written and revised in 18 months. Book 2 has poems that span 10 years. Book 3 about 12 years.

Revise +Edit: My revisions + editorial eye

Order + Send out to publishers: Keep sending until you get a yes!

When a publisher says yes... Production timeline begins. More editing. Cover art selection. Author Bio. Blurbs. Proofreading. Book launch reading!






